The World's Most Interesting Island: A Maltese Odyssey

There are places that murmur with the ghosts of time. There are places that sing with the laughter of the present. Malta became a lighthouse of Christianity, standing firm through centuries of siege and storm, even repelling the Arab invaders after centuries of struggle.

But perhaps Malta's brightest hour came in 1565, when the Ottoman Empire unleashed its might upon these tiny islands. Outnumbered, outgunned, but never outwitted, the Knights of Malta—led by the indomitable Jean de Valette turned back the tide in the Great Siege. It was a stand that changed the course of history, earning Malta the mantle of "Savior of Christianity." **Today, Valletta, the capital, rises in golden stone—a living monument to courage and conviction.**

Extraordinary Traveler - Bridget Crocker

Extraordinary Traveler Interview: Bridget Crocker

Q: How old were you when you began to dream of and imagine extraordinary adventures?

BC: By my junior year in high school, I'd flown roughly 70,000 miles as an unaccompanied minor, so I've always been a serious traveler. I grew up in Jackson Hole, Wyoming on the banks of the Snake River, and was very involved with cultivating survival skills through Girl Scouts and building forts in the cottonwood forest. Meanwhile, my obsession for *Choose Your Own Adventure* books and Indiana Jones films fueled my imagination. It was when I read *Rivergods* by Richard Bangs at the age of 17 that I realized I could combine survival skills, adventure and travel into a career, and that was the moment I began working to turn my dream of becoming an international adventurer into reality.

Q: What is one of the more extraordinary travel experiences that you have had?

BC: In my memoir, *The River's Daughter*, I write about the experience of evacuating a safety kayaker from the Zambezi River gorge after he'd come down with a debilitating case of heat exhaustion that veered into heat stroke several days into our trip. Evacuating him was a harrowing experience that involved climbing out of the gorge on a sketchy game trail —and even sketchier frayed rope—in search of a telephone or radio to signal for help in a pre-satellite-phone world. There were many challenges during this evacuation, including bypassing an armed guard and keeping the kayaker alive long enough to get medical help.

Many people are drawn to adventure travel as a way to challenge themselves and discover what they're capable of surviving. I was twenty-two years-old at the time of this evacuation, and it was extraordinary to learn at such a young age that I could truly rely on my own instincts and resiliency, even when faced with a stack of obstacles.

Q: Have you had a close call while traveling, and if so, did it motivate a reassessment or change in behavior?

BC: Yes, many close calls like the one above, but learning to trust my instincts has been such a gift and there have been many times when the kindness of strangers has uplifted and saved me. Once on an Omo River trip, a lion ate all our food in camp while we slept, and we had nothing but a small amount of gruel left to feed our group for several days. It was grim—there wasn't enough to go around and people started fighting over the gruel. As we carried on downstream, we were welcomed into a village and treated to the most wonderful meal, then sent off with food to supplement the gruel that lasted us the remainder of the trip. Close calls have taught me to allow for grace. The powerful connection we share with each other despite cultural differences is profound.

Q: Who are extraordinary travelers whom you admire? If you could sit down and speak with any extraordinary traveler, living or dead, who would it be?

BC: I admire Robyn Davidson, author of the memoir *Tracks*, who traversed the Australian outback with a camel and dog to explore the depth of her interior landscape. I'd love to sit down and speak with Sacajawea, the Lemhi Shoshone woman who guided the Lewis & Clark expedition, most of it while pregnant or with her infant son tied to her back. I am deeply curious why she didn't leave the expedition and rejoin her family when they encountered her tribe near the Salmon River in Idaho from where she had been kidnapped years before.

Q: What mindset do you adopt, or have naturally, when you venture into the world?

BC: For me, a mindset of curiosity is essential to extraordinary travel. What can I learn about the culture, wildlife and landscape of a place? Curiosity fosters greater connection and intimacy in relationships, and I see travel as a powerful way to build relationships with people, cultures and nature.

Q: What characteristics do you like to find in your travel companions?

BC: Kindness, curiosity, respect and someone who is committed to being teachable and flexible. Also, the courage to try new or uncomfortable things is so important to progressing in your development as a traveler.

Q: What is something you dream of doing - or a place that you dream of exploring?

BC: My father is from Maine and I have spent time there visiting family but I have never rafted the incredible whitewater there—the Penobscot, Kennebec and Dead Rivers. That is something I dream of doing in the near future. I've always dreamed of running Macal River through the Mayan Mountains of Belize, but unfortunately, the best whitewater was submerged several years ago when a dam was built. Now my dream is for the dam to be removed so the Macal River is free-flowing once again.

Q: As a veteran explorer and extraordinary traveler, any advice for a young traveler just setting out?

BC: Invest in your own ingenuity, rather than gear. Like Yvon Chouinard, legendary explorer and founder of Patagonia, said, "The more you know, the less you need." Also, your wealth is in your relationships, so invest in those heavily. I have such a wonderful network of friends all over the world, whom I cherish. Cultivate kindness and don't be afraid to ask for help or learn new ways of doing things. Pride is the antithesis of connection, where humility opens the door to lasting community, which is the ultimate boon.
