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#### The Best Wildlife in 2026

by Richard Bangs

Adventure, I've long believed, is the bright edge of awareness—those electric moments when the membrane between human and wild grows thin, translucent, and we glimpse our original selves reflected in untamed eyes.

As 2026 unfurls, the world offers a constellation of such moments, rare as eclipses and twice as stirring. From the desert canyons of Arizona to the primeval wetlands of Brazil, from Kenya's fossil-rich north to Mongolia's windlicked steppes, these are the places where the pulse of the planet still beats loudest—and where we, if only briefly, can sync our hearts to its ancient meter.

#### 1. Kenya: Footfall in the Dawn of Time

There is no wilder intimacy than standing on African soil with nothing between you and its creatures but your own breath. A walking safari in Kenya—boots whispering through the savannah grass, sun not yet fully committed to the day—is the closest you can come to the continent's original grammar.

This year, the path leads north to Lake Turkana, the shimmering jade scythe carved into the cradle of humankind. Here, in this stark, lunar basin, Nile crocodiles—giant, primeval, unblinking—crowd the black volcanic shores. They seem like survivors from a previous manuscript of Earth, relics that time forgot to erase. You move lightly, aware that every footstep is an offering, every shadow a possibility. In the Turkana winds, you can almost hear the echo of early hominids whose bones rest nearby. It is not a safari; it is a pilgrimage.

## 2. Serengeti Spring: Witness Wildlife Newborn



This is the place where life begins in thunder. The short-grass plains of the southern Serengeti, where the Great Migration is born.

In late February, the land turns emerald. Storm clouds stack on the horizon. And then it happens: more than a million wildebeest gather shoulder to shoulder, and the Serengeti becomes a nursery on a continental scale. Eight thousand calves a day drop into the world—wobbling, blinking, running within minutes—while lions, cheetahs, and leopards prowl the margins, testing the ancient balance between life and death.

This is Africa at its most raw and revelatory. You don't just see nature here—you witness creation in real time.

You'll live deep in the wild in our private luxury tented camp, perfectly placed - away from the herds, yet easily accessible. Days unfold to the rhythm of dawn game drives, Hadza trackers reading the land like a living manuscript, afternoons watching predators teach their cubs the art of survival, and sundowners as the plains burn gold.

Next, the Ngorongoro Crater—Africa's Garden of Eden—closes the circle in one of the most wildlife-rich places on Earth. This is not a safari many know about. But those who go, never forget it.







Adventure doesn't always require a passport—sometimes it flows just beneath the desert varnish of the American Southwest. The Salt River in Arizona is one such serpentine wonder, a brief, miraculous ribbon of spring snowmelt that carves through a wilderness seldom seen and barely believed.

A raft trip here is a fast-moving theater of the unexpected. Wild horses—manes tangled with sunlight—wade into the shallows as if to bless your passing. Javelina scuttle in comic procession along the bank. Coatimundi flick their ringed tails like exclamation marks. Coyotes sing from the ridges while raccoons steal the show with masked curiosity. Desert bighorn sheep perch on improbable ledges, sentinels of stone; a bobcat ghosts the underbrush; and if whisper and luck align, the ember-glow eyes of a mountain lion may watch your campsite after dark.

Above, the sky performs its own pageant: bald eagles spiraling on canyon thermals, great blue herons unfolding like origami into flight, egrets flaring white against red rock, roadrunners stitching quicksilver lines across the sand. Even the earth itself seems animate—rattlesnakes coiled in sunlit reverie, and the mythic Gila monster lumbering like a beadwork dragon across the desert floor. The Salt runs for only a few ephemeral weeks each year. To ride it is to borrow time from a river that rarely wakes.

## 4. Mongolia: Into the Kingdom of Ghost Cats and Sky Horses

Some places are so vast they swallow your sense of scale, leaving you as small as truth. Mongolia is such a place—a cathedral of sky stretched across an unbroken horizon, where the winds carry the songs of nomads and the hoofbeats of ancient migrations.

In 2026, a unique expedition with private-planes and scheduled flights offers access to Mongolia's wildest quadrants—an aerial thread stitching together worlds few have ever stepped foot in. Snow leopards prowl these crags, spectral and elusive, their presence more myth than mammal. Przewalski's horses, the last truly wild horses on Earth, gallop across the steppe with

the authority of ancestors reclaiming their dominion. Twin-humped Bactrian camels sway through desert dunes like ships of a forgotten armada.

Golden eagles wheel through cobalt skies; gray wolves course the valleys in disciplined formation; kingly argali sheep crown the mountainsides with curling horns that seem sculpted by storm; and Siberian ibex dance on cliff faces where gravity clearly has different rules.

To travel Mongolia this way—leaping between ecosystems by air, then grounding yourself in their silence—is to traverse not just geography, but epochs.

#### 5. Brazil: Pantanal—The Pulse of Water and Fang



If the Amazon is South America's mythic heart, the Pantanal is its sprawling, beating lung. This is the world's largest tropical wetland, a shimmering mosaic of rivers, lagoons, and grasslands that breathe in seasonal rhythms, expanding and contracting like a colossal organism.

A trek here is a wade into abundance. Capybaras—gentle, buoyant, vaguely amused—dot the banks in herds like shaggy punctuation marks. Spectacularly colorful tropical birds flaunt their vibrant plumes. Caiman slip beneath the surface with predatory punctuation. But it is the jaguar—the Pantanal's spotted sovereign—that draws travelers across continents. To lock eyes with this cat in the wild is to witness power in its purest syntax: muscular, deliberate, unhurried, aware of its dominion.

In 2026, the Pantanal is poised to offer encounters that feel almost tapirs ambling through mud as though sculpted from it. You leave with boots full of

marsh, memory full of pawprints.

#### The Wild Invitation of 2026

We travel not just to see wildlife, but to remember that we are wildlife—restless, curious, longing to belong in landscapes not shaped by our hands.

The year ahead offers rare portals into that truth. Whether it's the volcanic hush of Turkana, the desert-river secrecy of Arizona, the boundless steppes of Mongolia, or the liquid universe of the Pantanal, these journeys don't merely take us somewhere.

They return us to ourselves.





# Extraordinary Traveler - John French



**About John French** 

John French was but one thread in a tapestry of scholars, bums, intellectuals, drinkers, womanizers, feminists, stoners, hippies, punks, and misfits woven into the fabric of adventure travel in the early days of whitewater rafting. Starting on Northern California rivers, he quickly worked his way into the Grand Canyon crew and seized an opportunity to guide on the Zambezi River in Africa, which led to running rivers across the globe. What started as a summer job became an obsession as he traveled the world in a quest for the perfect oar stroke and the intimate melding of hands, oars, raft and river on a seam of currents through big whitewater. He is the author of The Tao of Running Whitewater: *Lessons from Rafting the World's Wildest Rivers*.

## **Extraordinary Traveler Interview: John French**

Q: How old were you when you began to dream of and imagine extraordinary adventures?

**JF:** I launched into adventures before I dreamed of them. At eighteen, I dropped out of college and pursued money-making schemes. At twenty-two, I took off across the country on my motorcycle, which was stolen in New Orleans, leading to a stint as a barker on Bourbon Street. The rest of that summer, I worked in the pits for a race car crew before hitch-hiking across the country to San Francisco and pursued a career as a stage actor,

which I dropped after a few years and moved to Hawaii. After a working in Italy for a few years to settle my traveling bills, I returned to San Francisco and seriously considered where to turn for my next adventure and, at thirty-two, I discovered the life of a river guide.

#### Q: What is one of the more extraordinary travel experiences that you have had?

**JF:** Of all the grand adventures I experienced around the world, I would say exploring rivers in Northern Pakistan was the pinnacle. We rode in old Willys jeeps for days, higher and higher on dirt mountain roads into the mountains of the Hindu Kush. We crossed Shandur Pass and launched at 10,000 feet into a small clear river that grew to resemble the Colorado. Imagine a rocky desert river with Himalayan sized mountains towering above. Absolutely fantastic!

# Q: Have you had a close call while traveling, and if so, did it motivate a reassessment or change in behavior?

**JF:** Running Class V rivers is always a dance with a close call, but in twenty years of rafting I never thought to myself, "This is where I die." Well, at least not while on the river. It would cross my mind while scouting rapids. The only change in my behavior has come with old age.

# Q: Who are extraordinary travelers whom you admire? If you could sit down and speak with any extraordinary traveler, living or dead, who would it be?

**JF:** Sir Richard Burton, the nineteenth-century explorer, was extraordinary. His work as a spy in The Great Game fascinates me. His feat of co-discovering the source of the Nile overshadows his many other accomplishments.

#### Q: What mindset do you adopt, or have naturally, when you venture into the world?

**JF:** Appreciation! I love working in another country to feel the cadence of language and the humor of everyday encounters. While stocking supplies for a river trip, or repairing gear for a season, the locals were so supportive of our efforts to run rivers in their backyard. We helped bring tourism to Victoria Falls, fight dams in Chile, and protect wilderness in Alaska. Each time I visit a country that I love, like Chile, I hope to return, but I remind myself that each trip could be my last time there.

#### Q: What characteristics do you choose in your traveling companions?

**JF:** A sense of humor is absolutely critical. A good laugh can get you through a lot of challenges.


#### Q: What is something you dream of doing – or a place that you dream of exploring?

**JF:** I never made it to China. I have studied Taoism and Buddhism for decades. However, the China of my imagination is probably far removed from the reality of China today.

# Q: As a veteran explorer and extraordinary traveler, any advice for a young traveler just setting out?

**JF:** Do it while you're young! Explore the world while you have the fire in the belly and are mad for experiences.






