

Marc Manseau, MD, MPH

Dr. Manseau is currently the Director of Psychiatry at Callen-Lorde Community Health Center and appointed as a Clinical Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the New York University Grossman School of Medicine. Previously, he served as the Medical Director for Behavioral Health Clinical Services at the New York City Health + Hospitals Central Office, and prior to that as the Director of Clinical Services for South Beach Psychiatric Center, a facility operated by the New York State Office of Mental Health (NYS OMH). Before this, he served in multiple policy roles for NYS, including as the Chief of Medical Services for the NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) and as the Associate Medical Director for Adult Services at OMH. In both NYS policy positions and in addition to other responsibilities, Dr. Manseau worked to help the NYS behavioral health systems better address co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders, including opioid use disorder (OUD) and tobacco use disorder (TUD). Dr. Manseau also served as a key fact witness for the New York State Attorney General's case against companies involved in manufacturing, distributing, and selling opioids, which resulted in total settlements of over \$1.5 billion. While serving as a medical leader in NYS government, Dr. Manseau continued to provide direct care, by working as a part-time psychiatrist at Callen-Lorde.

Dr. Manseau graduated with a degree in Human Biology from Brown University, where he also earned a Masters in Public Health. He completed medical school at the Columbia University Vagelos College of Physicians and Surgeons. After graduating from general psychiatry residency training at the New York University Grossman School of Medicine, he completed a fellowship in Public Psychiatry at Columbia University. He then worked as an Attending Psychiatrist in the Bellevue Hospital Outpatient Psychiatry Clinic, as well as the psychiatrist/medical director for Bellevue's OnTrackNY program, an intensive, recovery-oriented intervention for the first-episode psychosis population.

Dr. Manseau is certified in General Psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and in Addiction Medicine by the American Board of Preventive Medicine. He has conducted research, published, and presented extensively on various public health and policy-related topics, including behavioral health services delivery and treatment disparities, the role of prevention within psychiatry, co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders including cannabinoid use and the opioid crisis, and the social determinants of mental health. He is currently a Distinguished Fellow at the American Psychiatric Association and a member of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry (GAP), a psychiatric think tank.
