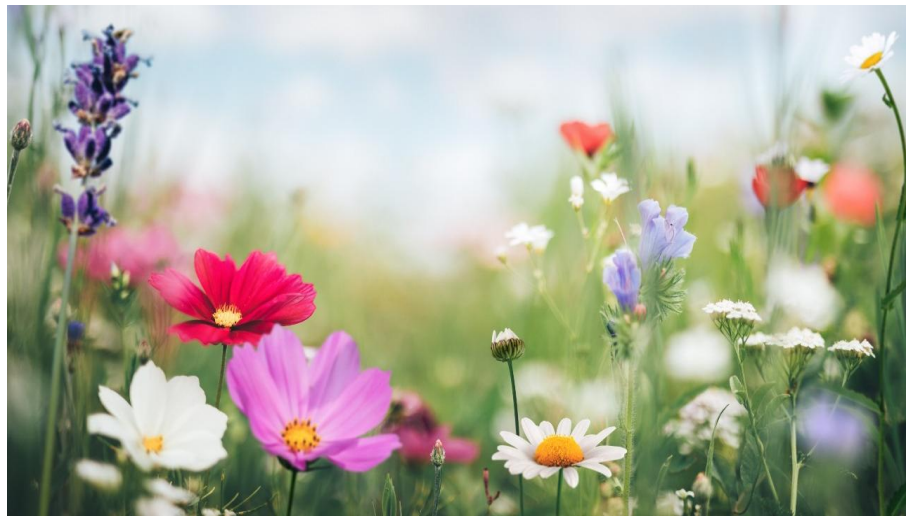

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Can Christ Count on You?

“As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love.”

#84 has just concluded and at the final Eucharist I asked the candidates and team ‘Can Christ Count on You?’

Over the course of a Cursillo weekend you pray, worship, listen, laugh, eat and perhaps cry together. You arrive carrying different stories. Some are excited, some uncertain, and some perhaps wondering, *What have I got myself into?*

But through it all there has been one constant presence among us: **Jesus Christ.**

And Jesus says: “As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love.”

That is where our Christian life begins—not with what we do for God, how much we know, or how successful we are at being Christians. It begins with this truth: **You are loved by God.**

Before you serve Christ, Christ loves you. Before you pray, Christ loves you. Even when you stumble, doubt or struggle, Christ calls you back into his love. Perhaps one of the great gifts of Cursillo is having the time to rediscover that simple truth: **God loves me.** But Jesus doesn't stop there: “This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.” The love we receive is meant to become the love we give away. That is why Cursillo cannot finish when we leave the weekend. **The weekend ends. Cursillo doesn't.**

You return to your families, parishes, workplaces and communities—but hopefully you don't return quite the same. Someone will need kindness. Someone will need encouragement. Someone will need forgiveness or a listening ear. Someone may discover Jesus through the way you love them. That is where **prayer, study and action** become more than Cursillo words. We pray because we want to remain rooted in Christ. We study because we want to know Christ more deeply. We act because the love of Christ cannot remain within us.

Jesus says: “You did not choose me, but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit.” Notice that little word: **Go.** Go back to your parish. Go back to your family. Go back to your workplace and community. Go into the ordinary places of life and bear the fruit of Christ's love. You don't need to do something spectacular. God's Kingdom often grows through small things—a conversation, a prayer, a meal shared, a lonely person visited, someone welcomed, forgiven or encouraged. And you don't go alone. Christianity was never meant to be lived alone. We need people who will pray with us, encourage us and remind us why we said “yes” to Jesus. That is part of the gift of Cursillo. **The weekend may be ending, but your Fourth Day is beginning.**

Tomorrow there will probably be no Cursillo bell, no team preparing breakfast and no inspiring talk waiting for you. There will simply be Monday. And strangely enough, **Monday is where Cursillo really begins.** So when you wake up remember: **Christ is counting on you.** Not because you are perfect. Not because you have all the answers. Christ counts on you because he has called you, chosen you, loved you and filled you with his Spirit. And when you wonder, *Can Christ count on me?* remember there is another question: **Can I count on Christ?**

And the answer is **yes.** When you are strong, Christ is with you. When you are tired, Christ is with you. When you don't know what to do next, Christ is with you. So go knowing that you are deeply loved. Go and pray. Go and learn. Go and serve. Go and love one another as Christ has loved you. And wherever God places you, let your life quietly say: **“Yes, Lord. You can count on me.”**

De Colores. Amen.

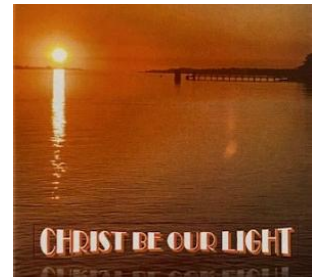

Our theme "Christ be our Light" was symbolised on the program by a sunrise reflection, shining first light over Hervey Bay. In St Johns Parish church, lamps and candles shone to show the way.



Sixty Cursillo members and friends from parishes across Southeast Queensland attended the Ultreya, hosted by St Paul's Maryborough, and St John's Hervey Bay. We were joined by Hervey Bay Parish Priest Father Greg Loumeau and Curate Rev Eleanor Whereat.



The church was full of colourful decorations inside, while the large Church windows and doors pictured the natural outside landscape, reminding us of God's creation. The decorations featured rainbows, the brightly feathered rooster and colourful butterflies. The music was led by Barry Grace on piano with Reg King on guitar, Neil Honey on drums and later Margaret King on organ. The joyful,

heartwarming singing began with the theme song, "Christ Be Our Light." A special addition to the program was the Cursillo themed song "God's Gifts" written by Ann Morris.

To the theme of the beautiful song, "Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God" Witness Speaker Margaret King, Hervey Bay Parish, was introduced. Margaret's words were deeply moving, inspirational, and motivational. 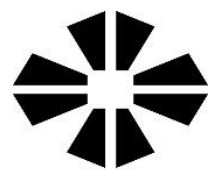

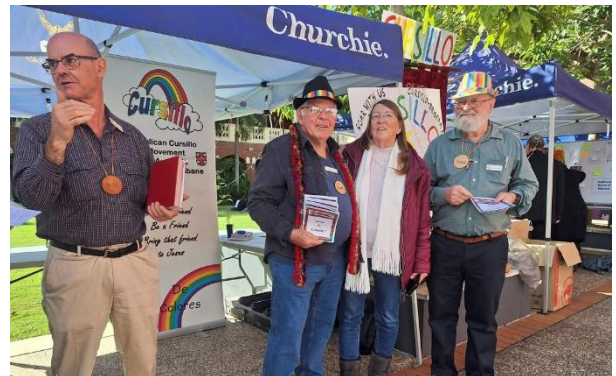
DSC Report for Sept 2026 by Nick Crisp

Brian's Camino By Brian Blinco

From 15 to 27 May 2016 I walked the final 150 km of the Via de la Plata from Xinzo de Lima to Santiago. That was a compromise on a more ambitious plan but a wise one. The route is probably the least popular, perhaps because it traverses the Galatian mountains and there are many hills and few townships. The more popular routes are full of tourist packages and hype.

Most of the time I saw few other pilgrims all day and a highlight was a day along the high ridges in the mist with views over the forest on either hand – close to God. That night I enjoyed a well-run albergue at Dozon.

My fellow travelers were mainly walkers rather than pilgrims and predominantly German with English speakers quite rare. That meant time to reflect and enjoy the peace of solitude; rare in these busy times. If the opportunity arises, go; and go quietly. You may not meet God but you will likely meet yourself.



Road to Santiago de Compostela By Bruce Moy

I walked the Camino along the French way. There are many ways to Compostela but this is the traditional way.

We started with a visit to the traditional starting point of Saint Jean Pied de Port in France 790 km from Compostela. We walked 360km in total and touched the hi-lighted section of the Camino.

For me, the most interesting parts were the people we met and spent time with: from the Czech Republic, France, Germany, Argentina, Columbia and many more. The story we were part of was the experience. It is so much more that a religious experience, it was the journey to somewhere.

The highlight of the trip was at the Cathedral in Santiago where during the pilgrim's mass the huge botafumeiro was swung through the nave of the church followed by communion in the church. An unforgettable experience.
