## THE STATE OF YOUR FAITH

The genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. How is the state of your faith? Will it uphold if tested by those around you? Or will you forget the teachings of Jesus and choose another path.

It is easy for us to listen and nod when we hear the teachings of Jesus, but when someone in your family or your church, even your parish priest does something that you don't agree with or like, I mean something that is so beyond that it makes you seethe, how do you react? Are you that angry you decide to leave the church and forget about your Christian beliefs, or do you remember the teachings of Jesus?

The Bible is helpful for us in these situations, the scriptures represent real people and speak to real life situations. What, then, does the bible tell us about anger? James wrote (1:19), “. . . let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger.” James tells us that anger is not wrong, because we are going to get angry; we are human. He does say, “Don't be quick-tempered.”

St Paul wrote in his letter to the Ephesians virtually the same thing: “Be angry, and yet do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger . . .” (Ephesians 4:26). James and Paul were being pragmatic. After all, anger is part of life; just don't let it lead you into sin. In these passages and many others, the Bible is essentially saying to lead a balanced life. The issue is not anger, but how much it controls us. Being slow to anger is a mark of strength, mastery, and leadership.

Finally, Paul told the folk in Ephesus: “Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamour and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. And be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you” (Ephesians 4:31-32). When you see the warning light of anger flashing on your control panel, don't instantly ditch the teachings of Jesus. And you don't have to react in despair or withdrawal into guilt. Repent it, reject it, walk away from it. Seek wise counsel in dealing with the issues that have made you that angry. You will find that most of them are resolved through forgiveness. Thus, when you reach out to receive Christ's body and blood you can do so with a forgiving heart and not one holding on to anger and grudges. We must come to the Lord's table with forgiveness in our hearts. Our faith must be genuine. Amen.

Parish Contacts are the key to good communication in parishes and we aim to provide better support for them if required. Sally Turnbull is keen to talk to all parish contacts. Regarding Cursillo weekend #83 next year, Di Catto, PreCursillo Registrar, is keen to hear from all sponsors so please contact her if you have candidates to put forward. 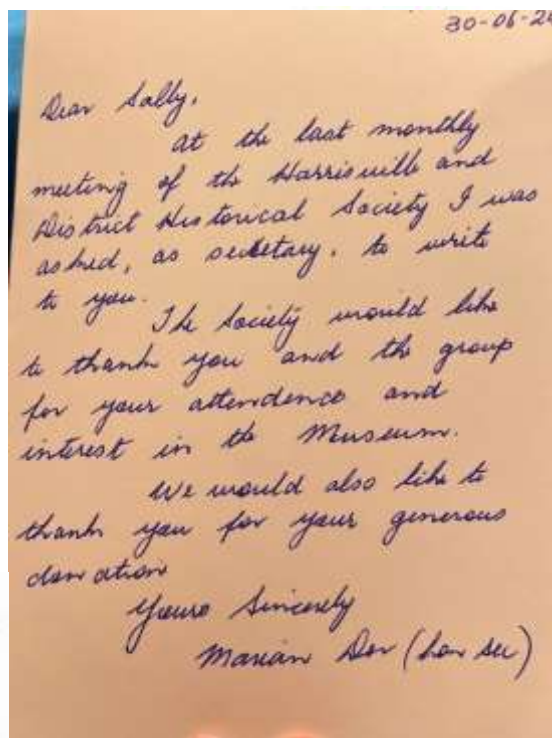

In 2023, two of the parish's Home Groups undertook the new Australian ALPHA course developed in 2022, with a view to holding a course for guests in 2024. # Fiji Mission

From our Parish of St John's Hervey Bay, a team has been going to Fiji to Koroipita Model Town Project. This project is north of Nandi, not far out of Lautouka. It was set up to help the very poor break out of the cycle of poverty. Initially, Fiji Rotary and N.Z. Rotary developed the project, but many different organizations have donated or volunteered.

Our team leader was holidaying in Fiji and heard about it, arranged a meeting with the manager and discussions were held as to how help could be provided. A team from our Parish has been going most years since 2011.

When the team came back and gave a report on what they had done and the friendships that were made, it made quite an impression on us. Graham and I have gone to Fiji four times now, putting our Cursillo ideals into action. We have not been disappointed. It is quite moving to see how some people live and are content. Here, with our living standards, many people still complain that they do not have enough.



It has been said before that we all should have an experience of how some people in other countries live. The Fijian people are so grateful for what we do. The last few times we have also helped St Tabitha's Orphanage. The ladies were able to make use of old timber at Koroipita to make some vegetable garden beds for the orphanage. So the "tradie ladies" denailed, measured and cut this timber to size and with the men, we went to the orphanage and assembled them.

At Koroipita, there were a variety of tasks that the ladies were involved with while the men did the building. Some ladies went with the nurse on her rounds, another spent several mornings at the kindergarten and a couple of others did some cataloging in the library which they are expanding. One day there was a desexing day of the dogs. Some of the puppies were too young, so we shampooed and cuddled puppies until they were dried and were given flea and worm tablets.

Morning prayer each morning and the fellowship developed in the team was wonderful. Just giving and helping to improve some of their lives was such a blessing.







# Fiji Mission - Another perspective



During the course of my Cursillo weekend in 2016, a particular bible verse kept coming to me: Jeremiah 29:11, *For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.* Little did I know the plans that God had for me! Since the weekend in 2016, I have been very involved in Cursillo Southern Queensland and have been on team several times. Fast forward to Cursillo 80 in 2021 when I was on team with Marilyn Greensill as Lay Director and my husband Peter was on M80 team with Max McClelland as Lay Director. Marilyn and Max are from Hervey Bay Parish.

In March 2024 at the Bundaberg West Ultreya, I was chatting with Marilyn, Graham and Bev from Hervey Bay Parish and they were talking about a mission in Fiji that they were doing with their Parish. "Wow, that sounds so amazing," I said. Pretty much in unison, Marilyn and Bev said, "Well, you could join the team and come with us." So, I called my husband, Peter, to join us and he too was interested. And so fast forward to August 2024 - Peter and I joined with the Hervey Bay Parish for Team Fiji 2024. What an amazing project and what a great team! The many details were organised by Dee, Hervey Bay Parish's Office Administrator, helped by her husband, David. So many facets, so much organization!

The guys in the team helped to build a community Bure and some cement steps for easier access to the 'houses'. House is a very loose term by Australian standards. However, it is shelter and they are cyclone proof, and those that live in Koroipita Model Town Project are very grateful for that. There is a very long wait list for Koroipita and there are plans to build more 'houses' as more land has been purchased by the trust.



Because there wasn't a significant building project for this year's team, the ladies did some work in the kindy, the new library centre and visits with the community nurse.

The stories of hardships are heart breaking and some situations were confronting – there is so much disadvantage. However, being able to help in a small way has been such a blessing for us on team. We met some lovely people - some were Christians and some weren't. The thing that struck me with all of the people that we met was how grateful they were for the small things that we were able to do for them - small but necessities for them. For some it was providing a food parcel, for others it was providing mattresses and blankets, for others it was providing a walking aid, for some it was providing adult diapers. We met adults and children who have Cerebral Palsy, as well as adults who have suffered from strokes. Diabetes is also a big issue in Fiji.

Peter and I had such great experiences helping the Fijians and supporting the Hervey Bay Parish team. Cursillo was instrumental in this journey as it was the connections made through Cursillo that led Peter and I to Team Fiji 2024.

## On and Off the Water

One of my passions is being in God's creation on the water - experiencing the sun, sea, wind and wildlife. In my 4th day, I continue to explore ways to do this.

When I retired from full time employment in [2010](#), I was eager to occupy my days with volunteer activities. We were parishioners at St Peter's Wynnum at the time and I was encouraged to join both the Mission to Seafarers at the Port of Brisbane and the new initiative of Sails at Bayside.

SAILS is an acronym for Sailing Adventures In Life Skills. It was originally formed by priests and parishioners from the 4 bayside Anglican churches at Wynnum, Manly, Waterloo Bay and Cleveland working with at-risk youth and disadvantaged members of the community. I was encouraged by the thought of sailing on the waters of the bay and sharing my enjoyment with youth and others who may not have had that experience - To feel sun and wind and waves, to see turtles, dolphins and dugong. I soon found myself surrounded by a group of like-minded Christian men and women who regularly met to administer, fundraise, maintain and conduct monthly events for the enjoyment of youth and families. Each sailing and kayaking session starts with prayer and is underpinned by prayer.

In 2023, the participants came from Silky Oaks Children's Haven, CREATE Foundation, BABI Youth & Family Services, Bahloo Women's Youth Shelter, Qld Program of Assistance to Survivors of Torture & Trauma, Little Dreamers, families in need and the general public.

What difference a day on the water can make! Disadvantaged youth may arrive sullen and unresponsive but as they are encouraged to help rig the boats and then sail them, they begin to chat and are keen to help with the packing up. One day, we had a refugee who had been a "boat person," but was terrified of the water. By the end of that session, she didn't want to come back in. The gentle Christian respect for each person brings positive outcomes. Sails continues to grow in its outreach to participants.

As with all volunteer organisations SAILS volunteers come and go as circumstances, age and health situations change. I would encourage all to consider this different outreach opportunity prayerfully and offer your support via prayer, financial or physical involvement.

My involvement has certainly proved to be rewarding in so many ways and enhanced my 4<sup>th</sup> Day.

# Winter Shelter Toowoomba

This program comes under the umbrella of Toowoomba Churches Care, and provides shelter, food and comfort for homeless guests during the winter months each year. The guests are vetted by our social worker who operates out of the Housing Hub and they must agree to certain guidelines to be part of the program. The maximum number of guests is twelve on any given night.

Guests are picked up at the bus exchange in the CBD and transported to each venue where there is a trailer with a shower and washing machine and drier. There is another trailer with stretchers, pillows and doonas that is taken to each church.

Churches, all from different denominations are each allocated a night of the week, and in some cases, two churches will share a night. Each venue has a venue co-ordinator who organizes and rosters the volunteers who have undertaken specific training, as it is essential for us to understand the concept of being an 'alongsider'. To be aware that there are certain precautions to be mindful of, to be respectful and not to ask probing questions regarding the guests' current predicament.

Volunteers have a variety of roles including bed making, greeting, cooking and overnight (as two people need to be awake all night just in case). Then we have the morning crew, to prepare breakfast and pack up. Each church also has a bus driver and two who transfer the trailers. This has been our fourth year at Toowoomba West, with many Cursillistas involved, and our most successful. With assistance some guests have found accommodation of various types, some have been able to return to their hometowns and several now have work.

Winter Shelter is an amazing outreach!

Her 4<sup>th</sup> day began with the realisation that God's love for her was far greater than she ever imagined, and how God has used the times since then to bring her to a better understanding of Him and the love He has for His people. Janette spoke of attending bible study groups and prayer meetings and the impact these have had on her. She has found these to be a great way to share in God's work with other Christians and a way to learn how to pray more effectively, finding different ways to pray with the aid of labyrinths, prayer chains, meditation, and a prayer loom which hangs

in St Gabriel's church. After weaving the fabric through the loom in prayerful thanks, she was then able to run her hand down over the other prayers which had been offered by others, offering them up to God again. What a rewarding experience! Rev Pauline gave a very uplifting Spiritual Response.

The musicians for the Ultreya were Peter M from Waterloo Bay with Bryan and Lynda from the Emmaus Community. Unfortunately, Peter was unable to attend at the last minute due to a family circumstance and Bryan and Lynda led the songs, which were uplifting and joyful.

Afternoon tea was an array of food and more fellowship, in true Cursillo style!

# Logo???

Moreton Deanery's Ultreya theme of Refresh reinforced the theme of change in Cursillo in our diocese. We all know that God's promises abound throughout scripture and each is precious. Following the flood, God said, *"The rainbow that I have put in the sky will be my sign to you and to every living creature on earth. It will remind you that I will keep this promise forever. When I send clouds over the earth, and a rainbow appears in the sky, I will remember my promise to you and to all other living creatures."* The rainbow is mentioned several times in scripture and has been a symbol of Cursillo for Cursillistas for decades. However, now it has a different association in some parts of society. On that point, we will never lose the rainbow, so keep your scarves and enjoy the colours but expect to see other symbols that we have used for years coming to the foreground. Tasmania is the home diocese of the National Cursillo Spiritual Advisor, Rev.
