Nearly 2,500 years ago a toy in China inspires an extraordinarily practical and necessary machine, the Helicopter. A name derived from two parts, "helico", which means spiral, and "pter" which means made with wings. Many inventors and scientists had their hand in the ultimately successful design and mechanics behind this useful aviation. From scientific principals in 1843 all the way to 1970 where the general completed design and innovations these were all important in the creation of the helicopter. The first successful rescue mission was in 1944, and today, this is the most common method for rescue and emergency requirements due to the maneuverability and speed. Speaking of speed, the fastest helicopter can fly at a speed of 293 mph. Helicopters have become the vehicle of choice for first responders, its use for medical evacuation, aerial firefighting, police aviation, disaster relief, and Coast Guard search & rescue are some of its main jobs. Though they generally fly at 12,000-15,000 feet, the highest recorded is 40,820. The majority of helicopters carry two to six people, the Halo can hold 80 troops in combat gear. This piece of avionics have saved the lives of millions and with continued research and development are stronger, faster and more capable than ever.








